INTRODUCTION

The development of interpersonal psychotherapy began more than 35 years ago; yet, for a variety of reasons, diffusion of Klerman, Weissman, and colleagues' interpersonal approach beyond the United States and into disease areas other than major depressive disorder occurred slowly. In the last decade of the 20th century, however, there was a virtual explosion of IPT research initiated around the globe. Much of this research involved highly creative adaptations of IPT, taking the treatment into a broad range of disease areas. Many of these efforts have now come to fruition, making this the appropriate time for the First International Conference on Interpersonal Psychotherapy. In addition, community clinicians are finally beginning to learn about the efficacy and flexibility of IPT and are anxious to learn more about this treatment. This First International Conference on Interpersonal Psychotherapy will provide an opportunity for them to learn about the multiple disorders to which IPT can be applied and the evidence for efficacy in those disorders. It will also be an opportunity for experienced IPT clinicians to refine their skills and for those who are not familiar with the treatment to participate in a basic training course.

The conference will take place June 9-12, 2004, in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania. The program will include plenary sessions on special populations served by IPT, on combining and sequencing IPT with other treatments including pharmacotherapy, on the psychobiology of psychotherapy, and a special plenary lecture by Myrna Weissman on the evolution of IPT. In addition, there will be panel discussions on the design and conduct of treatment studies and on challenges in IPT training. The program will also include rapid communications and poster sessions and "Ask the Experts" sessions, providing an opportunity for dialogue with the developers of the multiple modifications of IPT for dysthymia, bipolar disorder, eating disorders, traumatic grief and other disorders. The conference will conclude on Saturday, June 12; however, the ISIPT Interpersonal Psychotherapy Training Institute 2004: Introductory Training Workshop will continue through Sunday, June 13.

WHO SHOULD ATTEND

Presentations during the first two days of the conference will focus on a variety of issues including the development and evolution of interpersonal psychotherapy, clinical and research perspectives on the treatment, modifications of IPT for new populations and settings, and insights into the biological basis of change during therapy. Clinicians and clinical investigators trained in psychiatry, psychology, social work, counseling, and nursing should find the content of this first phase of the conference useful in their practice and research. The third day of the conference will focus on issues related to training in IPT and will include both introductory and advanced training workshops.

OBJECTIVES

At the close of the program, participants should be able to:

- describe the history and evolution of interpersonal psychotherapy
- explain the clinical conditions to which IPT is applicable
- discuss the data supporting its efficacy for various disorders
- analyze data on biological correlates of change in psychotherapy
- identify issues relevant to the design of studies of IPT and other psychotherapies
- recognize issues relevant to training in IPT

INTERPERSONAL PSYCHOTHERAPY (IPT)

Interpersonal psychotherapy (IPT) is a brief psychotherapy for treatment of depression, understood as a medical illness in an interpersonal context. Historically, its development is rooted in research that has demonstrated efficacy through a progression of trials over the past 20 years. IPT is an empirically proven primary treatment for acute major depression and can be readily combined with antidepressant medications to decrease relapse.

This two-day IPT workshop is an accredited continuing education learning activity for mental health professionals and family physicians. Enrollment is limited in order to ensure maximum opportunity for effective learning and participation.

FORMAT

The format of the workshop includes didactic presentations in combination with role playing and demonstration of techniques through a variety of media. Our goal is to impart an understanding of the principles, goals, and therapeutic strategies of IPT to enhance attendees' repertoire of clinical skills and engender increased therapeutic competence through this effective modality.

LEARNING OBJECTIVES:

At the conclusion of the program, participants should be able to:

- Explain a theoretical framework in the basic principles of IPT for treatment of depression
- Identify which patients are most likely to benefit from IPT and which patients will require combined IPT and pharmacotherapy
